With the realization across the globe of the ease of transmission of the virus and the increased risk for certain groups, we had to make difficult choices in the early spring about continuing our usual operations. We have always centered our educational activities around the Field University-

learning that is best done by "getting out in the weeds" to visualize battlefields or other Civil War sites. This of course requires Van travel is only possible with close proximity to one's fellow travelers. A fair portion of our tour participants are in groups at increased risk should they become infected with the coronavirus—age over 65 and possibly underlying medical conditions. We formed a medical advisory group of BGES members in early spring 2020, both physicians and nurses, who recommended that we stop touring immediately and go month by month to determine when our usual routine for travel would be safe for all our members. Unfortunately, as the months crawled by, we were forced to cancel or

our 20th BGES monograph, an outstanding work by Brig. Gen. J. Parker Hills just sent to members. The BGES Dispatches and the Medford collection articles we have continued to produce every week remain very popular and are helpful in recruiting, allowing more individuals to share in the educational benefits of the Society. Over the past year many small businesses have been forced to close due to the financial impact

of the virus. Representing the Board, I am pleased to report that despite challenges, BGES is alive and well. We had determined that we would need \$65,000 to get us to the end of 2020. We have met and exceeded that figure, and at year's end we are financially stable. The success of our being able to survive cancelling all our tours is in large part due to the efforts of our outstanding Executive Director Len Riedel. Len is the founder and public face of BGES, and through book sales, Facebook challenges, Giving Tuesday, membership dues, and direct member gifts, his personal connection to every member helped provide the funds needed to make it to 2021. He

touring as early as April. The Board will make the call on when it is safe to travel together.

Despite not touring we have remained busy with projects—refurbishing a cannon from Pamplin Park, designing and installing interpretive signage at Fort Branch in North Carolina, and publishing

Your support currently is allowing us to begin posting lectures from some of the nation's best historians for your review, and we hope to also present tour videos in the future. The tour schedule for 2021 has just gone out, and I'm making my choices now to be ready when registration opens—I hope to share a van with you. Your BGES Board consists of nine members with different backgrounds from across the country. We have different occupations, talents, and philosophies, but we all agree on one thing—there is no other group in the country that does what BGES does so well. As a nonprofit, the sole purpose for our existence is education. We fear that with the lack of teaching about the Civil War in our schools and colleges that eventually the War will fade from the country's collective memory. To help us remember our overall goal, we have adopted the motto "Saving America's Civil War The Board members all agree that BGES is currently well positioned to continue pursuing its educational mission. With the resumption of touring historic sites in the company of outstanding

historians we will quickly be able to get back on track. That will be fine for the present, but looking toward the future BGES needs to increase its outreach and educational efforts. Len has done an excellent job for 27 years essentially single-handedly, but the Society now must enlarge the staff to be able to handle the needs of increased programs and membership. Enlarging our membership

will allow more students of history to benefit from our programs, and will provide increased financial support for new staff and infrastructure. As always, our existence depends on the

generosity of our members.






