half dozen for Saratoga, seven for Custer, and so far 13 for Streight. July promises even better. The governments are responding to the protections afforded by immunizations, and thus far 100% of our attendees have been immunized. Daily temperature checks are unintrusive, and with recent CDC guidance, the trips have become maskless. We stand prepared to adapt to local restrictions, especially at mealtimes, but again to date, not a problem. I cannot guarantee there will not be a few "ooops" moments this summer, but things are looking good. I am optimistic that our international members will soon gain access to our programs when international travel is The key to all this is the security afforded by immunizations. The data show this is the only reliable way to resume life as we knew it before COVID. By getting immunized, you have all the options that go with being reliably protected. The side effects seem to be minor and rare.

The sun is coming out from behind the clouds, and June looks bright. Our first two returns to the field were both unqualified

programs: Saratoga, Custer, and Streight's Raid. We have a

jurisdictions, but that doesn't present a threat to those who are immunized. So far we haven't had to isolate individuals from the cohort, and social distancing for those folks is not difficult outside. Undoubtedly some folks who are not immunized will register and will be asked to follow the guidelines for their safety, but if you are immunized, we have no reason to restrict you at any of the indoor or outdoor activities. I remember the movie Apollo 13 when the command module had to be powered down to conserve energy. I remember the precise processes that were followed to power back up for the reentry and landing on earth. We have operated on reserve power since March 2020, and now we are restarting the primary power plant of our operations. That is our seminar and tour program. Historically, it has

produced more than 50% of our annual operating revenue, and once the tours are conducted, we have usually had as much as a 20% net that has supplemented our overhead expenses. During the shutdown, we challenged our donor base, and it responded strongly. If that continues, and we continue to grow, we will be in a good place going forward in this, our 28th year. We also found that book sales can play a significant role in our financial profile, and we encourage you to join in and

Conversely, those who do not elect to get immunized face the continuing restrictions; but, from our perspective, how they protect themselves is not a threat to our operations. Insurance-wise, we have to enforce the existing restrictions and protections in place by CDC or the individual

get your copies of our publications and others that we offer. We offered one new book last year and sold over 100 autographed copies—it netted us nearly \$2,000. Look for those opportunities and support them—everyone wins! We are in a good place to complete our video archives series this summer. With nearly 350 lectures and introductions, this is a resource every one of our members can enjoy for their \$75 or higher annual membership. Look for the bulk emails we send that give you the hot links to set up —nearly 200 members are already signed up, but there are nearly 300 of you who are not. It is a perk of membership. If you are a past-due member, you can gain access by rejoining. If you are not a member, you can become one and gain access within 48 hours. Another feature that comes directly to your desktop is our interview series. We started in January and will continue it throughout the year. The interview is free to all and, if you miss it, they are on our free YouTube site. You need merely to subscribe—that is free as well.

Administratively, I need to catch up especially with the tour registration forms. We are getting there. We changed our webmaster after more than 20 years, and there is a learning curve along with some changes we want to make. Contractors are taking over some functions that recur. Burford Smith is now in charge of conducting our tour program. I will be at a limited number of tours in the future—not because I don't love doing them, but because there is much to do here to keep the organization running effectively. We are also looking to the next generation BGES. How

will we run as my 30-year career winds down? It is all very exciting.




