

HQ Communiqué

It's March already and things are hopping here. January and February were not slow for BGES—some happiness and some sadness, but we "Endeavor to Persevere."

We lost some dear friends and supporters whom I had gotten to know over the years: Velma Crawford, Ken McGraw, Jeanette Christman, James Russell, Laurie Lowe, and, most recently, David Dubose. I got to know all through BGES some wonderful people. But it is one whom I specifically need to focus on, because he epitomized the spirit of the BGES. That was David Dubose.

Dave had been a member since I first met him and his wife and youngest child, who was newly born at our first Antietam symposium in Hagerstown in 1996. He was one face in a crowd of 50 or more attendees, and I later ran into him and his wife eating BBQ downtown the evening after the program ended. Thus began a lifelong friendship and partnership that truly was a win-win and win. We had a new monthly giving program that had just started, the BGES QuarterGuard Program. He was the first to sign up at \$25 a month. He never stopped giving-294 consecutive months—increasing annually until he was donating \$86 a month at the time of his death. He made arrangements to continue donating after his death, and his wife

Trish just sent in the first gift after his passing. Just like the two of them—he also asked his friends to support BGES with gifts to us in his memory. Well, we won't forget him.

I am proud to announce that the Board of Directors voted to rename the BGES QuarterGuard Program Dubose's Rangers. It is an elite group—presently 5% of the organization's members are enrolled in the Ranger Battalion. Dave was the first captain of the organization, and that mantle has now passed to Captain Laurie Schiller, a member of our Board of Directors whose donations range back more than 20 years.

Dave's second win was in Education. Dave was a path setter! He may have donated monthly to BGES, but, on top of that, he never missed supporting a BGES project. His and his family's names are on cannon, interpretative signs, and other lists around the country. Whenever BGES had a fundraiser for any purpose, including capital gift gifting, debt reduction, and the sort, Dave was all in. More than 100 various other donations—all told over 400 donations in his nearly 25 years! In addition, despite challenging health issues

that would have floored a lesser man, Dave served four years on the BGES Board of Directors as our Secretary/Treasurer.

Finally, Dave was completely immersed in the Civil War and history. Trish supported his passion, and Dave used BGES battlefield tours to relax and socialize. He attended more than 60 in his life, and he was second only to Char Lambert, who attended more than 80. Had Dave's health not intervened, he no doubt would have been top of that list as well. It was often during these tours that his fortitude and integrity showed forth. He had multiple cancers and beat them. Sometimes he couldn't walk with us; other times he had to abandon tours and return home. Yet never once did he ever complain about his lot in life, and the admiration from his countless friends in BGES grew. Sidelined on his birthday two years ago, over 50 BGES members reached out to him with phone calls and cards. In January 2020, 5 historians and 20 friends all came to Jacksonville at their own expense to honor him at a symposium we set up just for him. He came in his wheelchair, for now he had pulmonary fibrosis, and was on oxygen in need of a lung transplant. He could not endure the lectures and left after one night, but he joined us for a dinner in his honor. It was the last time his friends would see him.

Dave got his lung in June 2020, and we all had high hopes. But complications set in, and by the fall he was back in ICU. On February 14, Trish sent me a message that he was going on hospice care. As happens, family and friends flocked to see him and say goodbye. I asked Trish if he wanted to speak with me, and she came back and said yes. Shortly before he passed, I spoke to him and in an intensely personal and private moment he responded. Trish asked me to keep speaking to him, and so I reminisced for nearly 20 minutes until his children arrived. Dave passed shortly thereafter on February 17. I told him he had the patience of Job. Billy Joel sang a true tribute for Dave—"Only the Good Die Young." David Dubose was only 62.

Dave will be laid to rest on April 10 in Jacksonville, Florida. BGES members and friends are welcome. I will be there for him and Trish, as they were always there for the BGES and me.

Until next month, Endeavor to Persevere.



BGES Authors: Robert Jenkins is an expert in the Atlanta Campaign, and he has written two outstanding books on the subject: <u>The Battle of Peachtree Creek</u>: <u>Hood's First Sortie, June 1864</u> (2014), an excellent interpretation of the battle, and <u>To the Gates of Atlanta: From Kennesaw Mountain to Peachtree Creek, 1-19 July</u> <u>1864</u> (2015), which delves into the struggles of both the Union and Confederate armies in the final months of the Atlanta Campaign. Jenkins is a regular BGES tour leader, beloved for his animated and detailed interpretation, and his knowledge and wit translates formidably onto the written page. As one reviewer wrote about *To the Gates of Atlanta:* "I thoroughly recommend this book for the significant truth that it reveals: The Civil War was far more than a series of major battles. ... Robert Jenkins brings these men back to life for us to contemplate their stories and their sacrifice."
