

### HQ Communiqué

Happy New Year! As 2020 dawns bright, I view this as the start of a new chapter in the history of the BGES. April commences the 27th year of operations. While we will continue to do what we do best, everyone will have to step up their game a notch or two. In business, if you are not getting larger you are getting smaller. We have talked about it for some time, but BGES has to get larger. With about 400 active members, we are not as large as some of the more robust Civil War Roundtables. Of course, we ask much more of our members, and our agenda is both forward thinking and in many ways self-limiting. Many people render faint praise and suggest they support what we are doing, but when it

comes time to put the shoulder to the wheel, they are somewhere else, or when they say they will sign up or join the BGES, the check never arrives. After so many years, that is normal and not distressing—we must move ahead, as there are still plenty of needles in the haystack and many diamonds in the rough.

As you are online, you certainly will notice that we have stepped up our game with meaningful and interesting communications that educate and bring the BGES logo into the "line of site" of the public. We are transmitting to just about 5,000 people, and approximately 1,000 to 1,200 are opening our emails—that is a GREAT START!

Let us reflect for a moment on the structure of a "society." We are a people of common interest and shared commitment to "Help Save America's Civil War History!" In doing so, we find ourselves compelled to ensure we are "Revealing Our Past for Our Future." As we enter 2020, I am going to ask each and every one of you to do two things—just two.

First, I want you to commit to recruiting and ensuring at least one person you know joins the BGES at the Volunteer (\$75 level). Only one person that you know and with whom you share a love of American history. Let me help you with the math. If each of 400 people recruits one new member, how many members will we have this time next year? 800. Right you are! Will you do that for our society?

Second, will you give us the names, and email addresses, of at least three people who are not members of the BGES, and whom you share emails with? With that, I am going to ask you to provide us with the emails of at least two other youngsters who are not presently involved with the Civil War but are interested in history. By youngsters I mean 40 years of age or younger, down to and including high school and college students.

That is all. I suspect you could complete the task while reading this communiqué or with a phone call or visit with an old friend. It is the great mission of BGES in 2020. We must grow or we eventually will die. After 27 years, that would be a shame. I have reinforced this with a hard mailing to active members. I hope you will take the time to do your part. In the meantime, I will keep doing mine.


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## How to Get the Most Out of Civil War Touring


