In Memorium

While life goes on, the world is a little less for the recent passing of the following BGES members, who also were great friends. May they all rest in peace.

Gene Dennis is one of two men responsible for funding BGES in its developmental years. A California Food Broker, he donated at a level that made it possible to continue developing BGES when revenues were inadequate to sustain operations. As Executive Director Len Riedel remembers, Gene insisted, "Never be afraid to call me." Len wasn't, and the financial support kept BGES afloat for more than three years. As member #43, Gene took a liking to us at our very first tour in Richmond (The Seven Days), and he never waned in his passion, enthusiasm, and support.

Charleen Lambert was an indispensible fixture in the BGES' fabric. For many years, the retired CPA attended between eight and ten BGES tours a year. She ultimately established the record for the most programs attended in our history. Charleen also earned the BGES' "Dad Award" for meritorious service by transitioning our accounting program and training employees on the use of QuickBooks online.

Bob McKinnon was a new member of the BGES, brought to us in 2017 by his brother Bill. Bob was a traveling man whose dignity during his final illness was inspirational. Bill had hoped Bob would join him on the 2018 Harpers Ferry program, but his health deteriorated before then and the trip could not be made. A real gentleman.

Stewart O'Bannon III was a member of the BGES Board of Directors, a kind soul, and a sage advisor. A practicing attorney in Florence, Alabama, he was the "whispering voice in the Executive Director's ear."

Henry Trawick was a driving force in the Manasota Civil War Round Table and a highly respected Florida attorney. He was the close friend of Ed Bearss, and his support of preservation and BGES was both generous and unflagging. Henry never missed a chance for something new and often would fly to a BGES tour or one or two new sites and then fly home the next day. Dependable man.
