

I have evaluated approximately 11 tours over the past three weeks and moved ten of them —two to 2021—and cancelled one. Our first planned tour will be in the Shenandoah Valley right after the 4th of July. At the same

time, I have coordinated with all our historians and we have agreed on programs and dates;

the tour schedule for 2021 has been submitted to the Board of Directors for consideration and approval. The list will be released the first week of June, and programs in the first few months of 2021 will be open for registration at that time. It bears repeating that the BGES has a wide range of meaningful projects and educational programs, and just because we are not in the field at our Civil War and related Field Universities does not mean we are on idle. I think you can see that. The virus has been a formidable obstacle to our full program, and its final impact is yet to be known. I think our

major challenge is Social Distancing and the nature of our tours. It is both a confidence issue and a public health issue—the group of people most at risk look like a group picture of our cohorts. No doubt many will want to see the course of the virus and that remedial

options are available and functional across society. Support issues are also unknown at this time. I think it is reasonable to assume that the answers to all these questions will reveal themselves in due course. Issues of liability have yet to be defined. All this could reap further destruction on our plans. I will remain flexible. I am certain we will return to the fields—will it be in 2020 and in July? That is what we are shooting for, but as each day brings new data points to consider and respond to, what I say tonight on April 30 could very well be overcome by events on May 7. Time will tell. Let me close with a few positive words and an invitation. As I said, membership is slowly rising and attrition is practically nonexistent—thank you. Our email blasts are reaching over 5,000 people now, with the range of people reading them ranging from 900 to as many as 1,300 people. Given we have but 440 members, that is very encouraging. Many may soon

become members—we will be inviting them soon.




